The Gascoyne's strength lies in the diversity of its economy, including tourism, agriculture, fisheries, aquaculture, resources, renewable energy, national defence and space industries.

NATURAL ASSETS



Home to iconic natural attractions like Ningaloo Reef and Shark Bay World Heritage Site, the region draws eco-tourists and adventure seekers.

The Gascoyne's 600 km coastline, sunny climate, and marine biodiversity make it a prime destination for nature-based tourism including diving, whale shark tours, and coastal recreation.

Tourism remains one of the Gascoyne's major industries, supported by globally recognised destinations and natural environments.

RARE EARTHS AND MINERAL RESOURCES



The Gascoyne region is rapidly emerging as a significant hub for mineral resources development, particularly in rare earth elements (REEs) and critical minerals.

Salt and gypsum are mined at Lake MacLeod, contributing to the region's resource sector.

The resources sector supports local jobs and contributes significantly to local economic activity.

The future of the Gascoyne is sustainable development that leverages our natural assets to create a resilient economy and that supports the wellbeing of the Gascoyne's diverse and vibrant communities.

RENEWABLE ENERGY

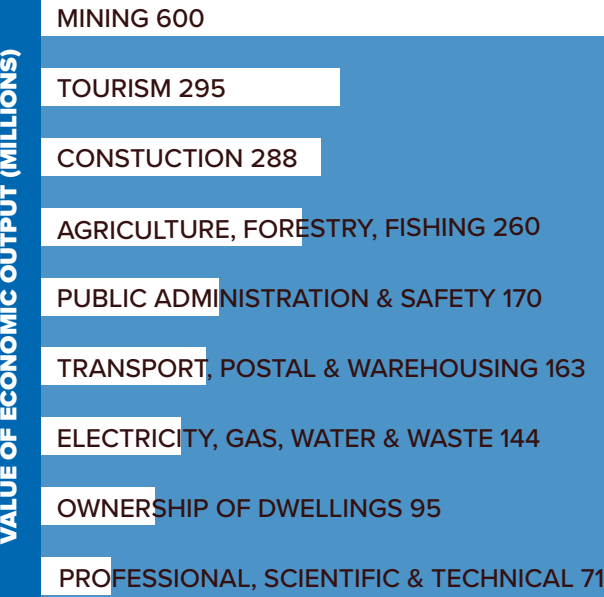


The Gascoyne region is characterised by exceptional renewable energy potential, driven by its world-class solar and wind resources, vast land availability, and strategic proximity to export markets.

High solar irradiance and clear skies make the Gascoyne ideal for large-scale solar installations.

The Gascoyne region is also highly regarded for mean wind speed and capacity factor and is among the highest in Australia. Wind patterns are consistent and strong, especially at night, complementing solar for a balanced 24-hour energy profile.

ABOUT THE GASCOYNE DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

The Gascoyne Development Commission's purpose is to promote economic and social development across the Gascoyne region of WA. We work for the benefit of communities and industry across our region.

OUR ENABLING LEGISLATION

The Gascoyne Development Commission is a statutory authority of the Western Australian Government established in 1994 under the *Regional Development Commissions Act 1993*. The GDC is subject to the provision of the *Financial Management Act 2006* and the *Public Sector Management Act 1994*.

OUR OBJECTIVES

The GDC is one of nine Regional Development Commissions in WA each established to serve their unique regions and to achieve specific objectives defined in the *Regional Development Commissions Act 1993*.

Our objectives are:

- Maximising job creation and improving career opportunities in the Gascoyne
- Developing and broadening the economic base of the Gascoyne
- Identifying infrastructure services to promote economic and social development within the region
- Providing information and advice to promote business development within the region
- Seeking to ensure that the general standard of government services and access to those services in the region is comparable to that which applies in the metropolitan area
- Taking steps to encourage, promote, facilitate, and monitor economic development in the region.

WE DO THAT BY:

- Promoting the region
- Facilitating coordination between relevant statutory bodies and state government agencies
- Cooperating with industry and commerce, employer and employee organizations, education and training institutions and other sections of the community within the Gascoyne
- Identifying the opportunities for investment in the region and encouraging that investment
- Identifying the infrastructure needs of the region, and encourage the provision of that infrastructure in the region
- Cooperating with other parts of government: including local, state and federal governments, to promote equitable delivery of services within the Gascoyne.

RESPONSIBLE AND REPORTING MINISTERS:

The Gascoyne Development Commission is responsible to the Minister for Regional Development. The Minister has the power to direct the GDC either generally or with respect to a particular matter, on the exercise and performance of our powers, functions and duties under the Act.

The Gascoyne Development Commission also reports to the Minister for Gascoyne following the creation of that portfolio in March 2025.

GOVERNANCE:

The GDC is governed by a Board of seven people, including six members variously representing local government, community and Ministerial nomination, and the CEO, who is a member of the Board by virtue of office.

All members of the Board and staff are regionally based and contribute specialised skills, experience and local knowledge that benefits the Commission and the communities of the Gascoyne region.

Integrity: We always remember the needs of the government and community we serve. We are committed and focussed on delivering. We follow through.

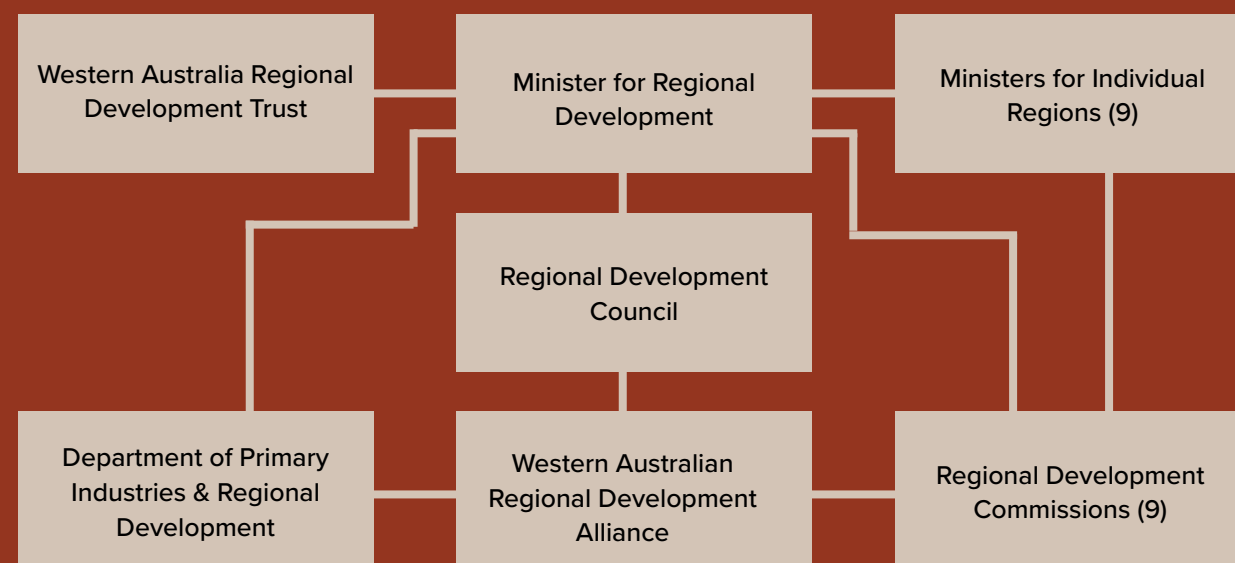
Leadership: We provide leadership in our community. We listen to others, build relationships, and use our skills to create solutions.

Ensuring that the Gascoyne's regional and remote communities have access to the **infrastructure and services** we need. Including access to **healthcare**.



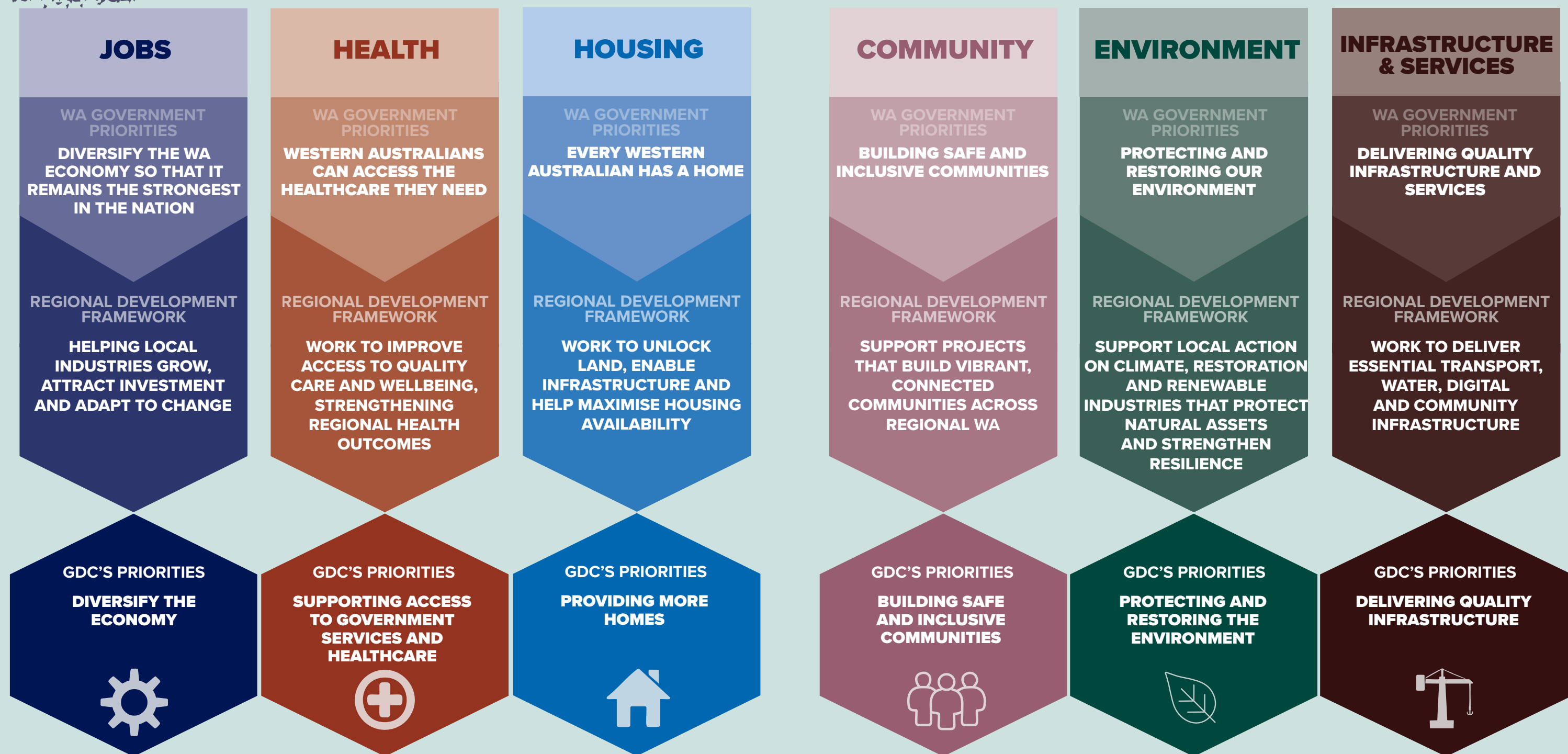

The GDC continues to support the Gascoyne Food Council to guide the festival in a stronger, more sustainable direction.



BUILDING SAFE AND INCLUSIVE COMMUNITIES

Carnarvon Common Ground Project

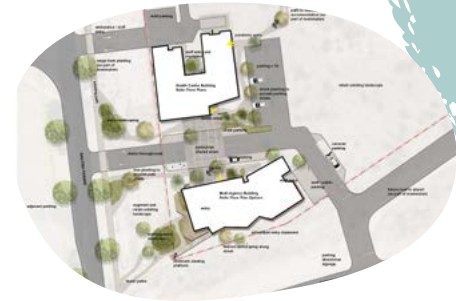
Carnarvon's community and service providers are working together on this project with the aim of delivering services that are tailored to the unique social needs of the town. GDC is proud to be supporting this project and is helping the community group develop into an operational Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisation to address social issues in Carnarvon.



SUPPORTING ACCESS TO GOVERNMENT SERVICES AND HEALTHCARE

Coral Bay Multi-User Facility

Coral Bay is one of the Gascoyne's most treasured coastal destinations and is described as the jewel in WA's coastal destination crown. As Coral Bay continues to grow in popularity, the need for reliable and accessible services also increases. The GDC is working with the Shire of Carnarvon and the Baiyungu Aboriginal Corporation to progress planning for a new Coral Bay Multi-user Facility.



PROTECTING AND RESTORING THE ENVIRONMENT

Gascoyne Renewable Generation Potential

Marine infrastructure presents a critical opportunity for economic development in the Gascoyne, addressing the barriers to accessing international and domestic markets for green energy, basic raw materials, mineral resources including rare earths, horticultural and other products. The GDC is supporting investigation of marine infrastructure solutions.



PROVIDING MORE HOMES

Accommodation Redevelopment

The Gascoyne region faces a critical shortage of residential housing and workforce accommodation. This is a significant barrier to economic development across key industry sectors, constraining workforce attraction and retention. Through the RED Grant Program, the GDC is supporting the Shire of Carnarvon's Essential Worker Accommodation project, building essential workforce accommodation in Carnarvon.



DELIVERING QUALITY INFRASTRUCTURE

Tantabiddi Boat Ramp

The primary boat launching facility for access to the northern Ningaloo Reef is at the Tantabiddi Boat Ramp, approximately 35 km from Exmouth. The Tantabiddi Taskforce, including the Gascoyne Development Commission, has progressed options to better meet the current and future needs of recreational and commercial vessel operators.



IMPLEMENTATION, MONITORING AND EVALUATION

This Plan sets out the Gascoyne Development Commission's approach to delivering economic development in the Gascoyne over the next four years.

Collaboration with partners is an important part of this plan. The strategies we've outlined here are high-level and broad, due to the nature of regional development and economic development practice. They allow us to focus our resources and effort in ways that deliver impact, whilst responding to the priorities of the government of the day, and the direction from the Minister for Regional Development, our Board, and local stakeholders.

Where new, unforeseen regional development issues and opportunities arise, the Gascoyne Development Commission may pivot, and redirect resources, to address an emerging challenge or opportunity, and to leverage economic benefits.

The Gascoyne Development Commission board is accountable for the priorities within this Strategic Plan and delegates operational responsibility to the CEO and staff to implement it. Our work is guided by an annual implementation plan, approved by the Commission's Board.

We monitor and report on our performance, including the implementation of this strategic plan and our obligations under the Act, using an outcome-based management structure approved by the Minister for Regional Development, Department of Treasury and audited by the Office of the Auditor General (OAG). The GDC reports on two key performance indicators through that framework: one measuring effectiveness of the agency based on client satisfaction and the other measuring efficiency based on average cost per hour of our operations.

Internal monitoring mechanisms will be facilitated through our implementation plan, regular reporting against the priorities of the Strategic Plan to the Board at Board meetings, through internal auditing processes and through the State Government's Annual Reporting process. The Commission's Annual Report is publicly tabled in Parliament each year by the Minister for Regional Development and is available on the GDC website.

The Commission will measure and evaluate the progress of its goals, strategies, and actions each year.
